We still have the Reading FSA coming up at the end of the month. It's important to understand that passing this exam is a graduation requirement. This is why we are working so hard to prepare our students to be successful. As you may have noticed, your child has been working in a program called *NoRedInk*, which offers unlimited grammar practice in a personalized setting. With honors, AP, & CTE coursework throughout their four years at STHS, our students must know how to write; they must know how to craft a sentence; and they must know how to communicate clearly. In addition to their classroom instruction, *NoRedInk* allows students to practice a myriad of skills designed to improve their ability to write as well as understand the true power of language.

Our “Spoken Word” poets created and prepared their individual and group pieces for *Louder Than a Bomb (LTAB)* poetry slam, held on March 28th, split between two locations: Dolphin Stadium & Savor Cinema. Students compet-

ed against poets from Homestead to Port Saint Lucie.

I couldn't be more proud of our poets; they are creative, eloquent and brave! Each of our individual poets performed one or two of their original pieces: Tatyana Joseph, Briana Guallat, Christina Williams, Christina Frasier, Tannesia Speed & Larene Lane.

The goal of the slam is to inspire diverse youth to share their stories. The high school slam teams present individual poems, and a group piece is performed by four people. Each team competes in two preliminary bouts; four teams compete in each bout. The top 16 go onto semi-finals, and the top 4 go onto finals. The name of the slam comes from the “Public Enemy” song of the same name.

As *LTAB* likes to reiterate, the point is not the points but the poetry. Nonetheless, each of our poets scores ranged in the 8 - 9s out of 10. Our poets are jazzed and want to ensure they are more prepared for next year's slam. This is STHS's third year with a Spoken Word club. Back in 2014 we had one individual poet, Obey Mima, and this year was our first with six individuals and two teams. Our sister school, McFatter represented very well, loud & proud (won their bout and should be advancing). I see our poets cultivating their craft and getting our name out there more and more.

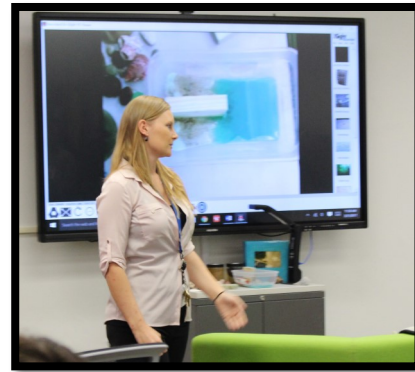
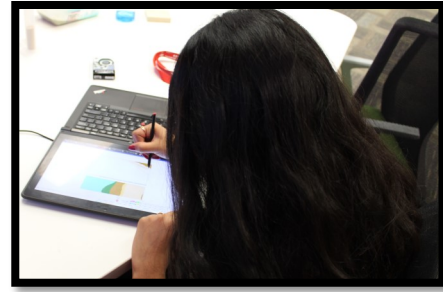
Teaching & Learning Spotlight

Wave Lab Helps Students Learn About Beach Formation & Erosion

In Ms. Smith's Marine Science class, we did a lab about beach formation and erosion. We were able to create a beach in a small container. We layered different types of sand to create a natural looking shoreline. On the side of the bucket, you could see the different types of layers; note, this was very important within the lab. The first waves created were small waves. We took a wooden block and placed it at the end of the bucket and moved it back and forth continuously for 5 minutes, making waves small enough that they barely disturbed the beach.

Through this lab, we were able to observe the process of erosion and expansion of the bottom layer of sand. Secondly, we were to create large waves for 5 minutes. We were able to see the transition of layers over time. We concluded that, the larger a wave, the more erosion and disturbance it creates for a shoreline. Lastly, we were to create a jetty using a second block and, again, create waves for 3 minutes. During this process you could see there wasn't much going on due to the fact that the jetty was there to keep the sand from moving. Overall, this was a fun lab and students now understand waves and erosion better.

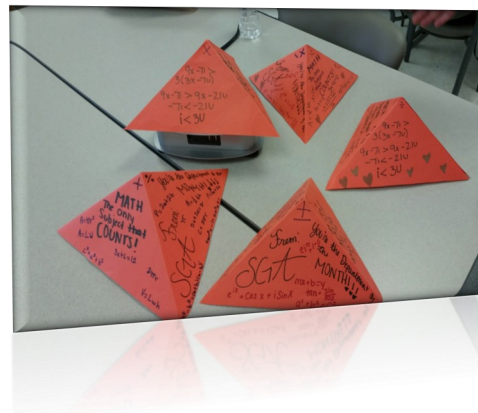

DigiGirlz, sponsored by Microsoft, allowed STHS Juniors (and other high school students across the district), to learn about careers in technology, interact with Microsoft employees, and participate in hands-on computer and technology experiences.

“We started the day by taking a tour of the Microsoft Office and learning how each department operated. We visited the PR team, marketing team, and the legal team. Each individual had different educational backgrounds; however, they were able to combine their degree with technology and obtain a job. We also got to experience the Xbox Live and the HTC Live. Using the Xbox console we were able to play a racing game, *Just Dance 2016* and *Just Dance 2017*. The *HTC Vive*, is a virtual reality headset, which turns the room into a 3D space via sensors. We ended the day with lunch and a coding exercise, using Hypertext Markup Language (HTML) and Azure.

My favorite part of the tour was not only playing *Just Dance* with my peers, but seeing all of the intelligent and strong women working in such a major tech company—it was inspiring. 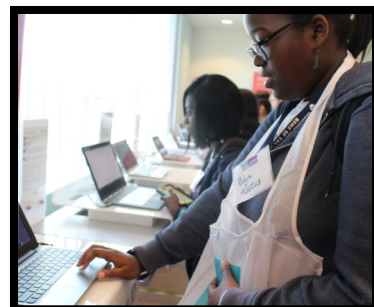

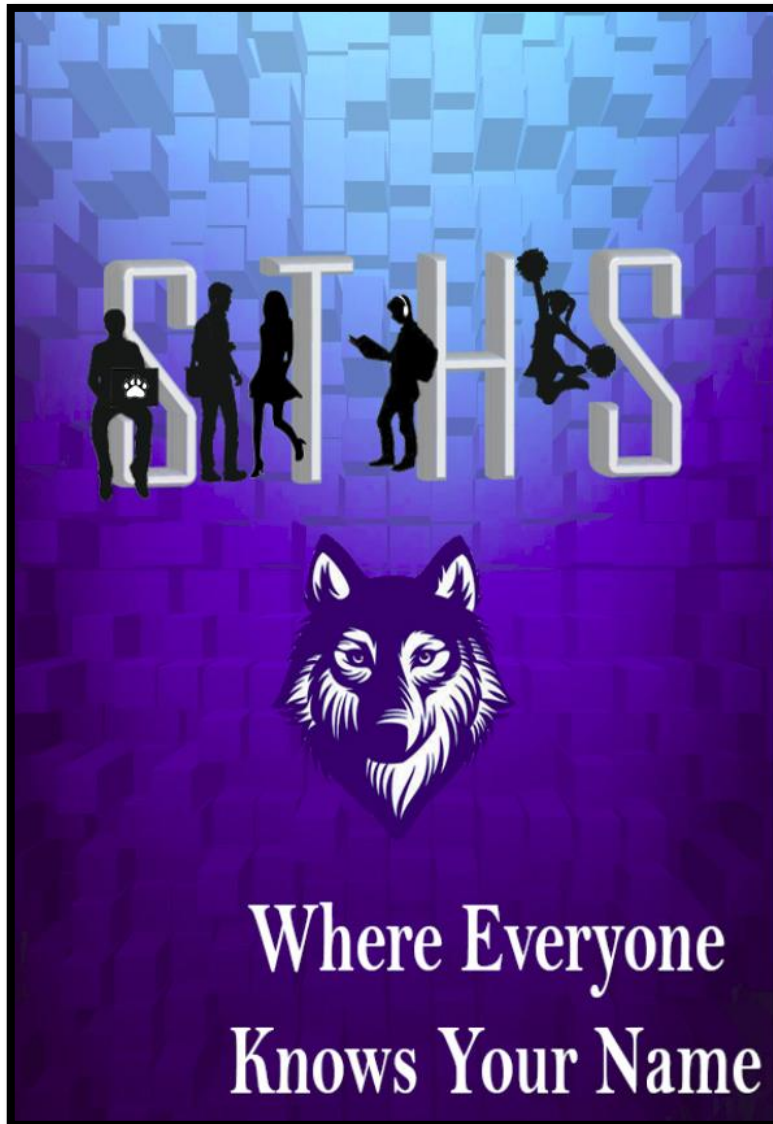
