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Page 3 Thereupon, the following proceedings were had: 1 2 3 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: First up is the Pledge of Allegiance. Though I'm not going to ask everyone 4 5 to stand because the camera's always in the wrong 6 spot. 7 (Pledge of Allegiance was recited.) 8 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. Thank you. 9 Can you go ahead and do the roll call? 10 MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Ruth Carter-Lynch? 11 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I think she said she would 12 be on mute. 13 MR. JABOUIN: Okay. Ms. Ruth Carter-Lynch is 14 acknowledged. 15 Mr. Anthony De Meo? MR. DE MEO: 16 Here. 17 MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Mary Fertig? 18 (No response.) 19 MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Itohan Ighodaro? 20 (No response.) 21 MR. JABOUIN: Doctor Nathalie Lynch-Walsh? 22 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Here. 23 MR. JABOUIN: Mr. Robert Mayersohn? 24 MR. MAYERSOHN: I'm here. 25 MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Phyllis Shaw?

1	MS. SHAW: Good morning. I'm here.
2	MR. JABOUIN: Okay. Others in attendance,
3	Chair Lynch-Walsh, is myself, Joris Jabouin, the
4	Chief Auditor. From the Office of the Chief
5	Auditor we have Ali Arcese, Dave Rhodes, Jennifer
6	Harpalani and Jeremiah Carter. And then we have
7	Tim Bass, the court reporter, is also here. And
8	Wanda Radcliff from the Office of the Chief
9	Auditor.
10	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. All right. So we
11	got everybody, unless we have missed someone.
12	Do we have any people here for public
13	comment?
14	MR. JABOUIN: We have not heard from no
15	one had emailed us at this point.
16	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. And I don't see
17	anyone other than people that are on the
18	committee or staff.
19	Okay. All right. So no public comment at
20	this time.
21	Okay. So we, at our October meeting
22	discussed, we had a special meeting and we
23	discussed creating a policy for the audit
24	committee because each school board established
25	committee is either supposed to have a resolution

or a policy governing them. So we started the conversation then and I have created sort of a four-step process that is our next -- probably our next step. What should be available on-line, it was because I looked, are the policies that we looked at prior, just to kind of refresh everyone's memory. Just a second.

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8 So we had dug up from the archives the 9 proposed school board policy from 2015, which 10 once we looked at it, it's essentially our 11 bylaws. And then we also looked at policies from 12 Palm Beach and Miami-Dade.

13 So I think we have gone through here and had 14 discussed going through here -- going through 15 these and incorporating them, but what I want to propose is a four-step process where we pull the 16 17 language out of the bylaws and the Office of the 18 Chief Auditor policies that should be in our 19 policy. So that would be most of this. And 20 whatever is in the chief auditor's policy that 21 refers to the audit committee, but isn't already 22 incorporated somewhere else.

Then there's sort of a policy template that we need to start filling out with boilerplate language and then incorporating Palm Beach and

Page 6 Miami-Dade policy elements, changing or excluding 1 2 mentions of the inspector general because they 3 both have inspector generals. I believe they both report to the school board. 4 So that would 5 change to the chief auditor where relevant. And 6 then reviewing the proposed policy which would be 7 put together in a matrix format at our second 8 January meeting which I think is the 25th. 9 MR. JABOUIN: Yes. 10 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. Because the 11th is 11 going to be our second attempt at the November 12 meeting for the most part. 13 So today on the agenda -- I don't think I 14 pulled up the agenda. The agenda is available 15 on-line from the website, not a ton of stuff on it, but -- let's see, audit --16 17 MR. JABOUIN: Are you looking for the agenda 18 for this meeting, Chair? 19 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yeah, I'm about to hit it 20 in a second here, it just takes multiple clicks. 21 I thought I had it pulled up but I have 22 everything but that pulled up. 23 Okay. So today we've got all the policies 24 that are relevant, Miami-Dade, West Palm Beach, 25 what was proposed back in 2015, the bylaws as

they are approved and what was revised but not 1 2 approved yet, because nobody's bylaws, I think, 3 have been approved by the Board recently. Policy -- School Board Policy 1070 that's sort of 4 5 boilerplate language that applies to all There may -- there's language in 6 committees. 7 Policy 1700 that refers to the audit committee, 8 but most of that may also be in the bylaws. And 9 then anything we wish to incorporate from Miami-Dade and Palm Beach. 10

11 So that's -- so if everyone's good -- so the 12 four-step process, we can go through today just 13 to refresh our memories because it's been since October. The Miami-Dade and West Palm Beach 14 15 policies, what I did this morning is, I went 16 through and started highlighting. If I can get 17 it. Yeah, there we go. Highlighting elements 18 from there, and if we're okay with what's in 19 these two and incorporating it, what I would do 20 is create a matrix that has where the language is 21 currently, whether it's in our bylaws, Palm 22 Beach, Miami-Dade, the chief auditor's policy, 23 and what we would include from there, so that we 24 have sort of a -- a comprehensive document of 25 everything that we want in there.

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Page 8 So who was at the October meeting, Mr. De 1 2 Meo, Phyllis; were you there? Were the two of 3 you? And Mr. Mayersohn, I remember Mr. -- I say I remember Mr. Mayersohn, but I just might be 4 5 assuming he was there. 6 Were you guys all at that meeting? 7 MR. MAYERSOHN: Yes. MS. SHAW: 8 Yes. 9 Okay. Well, in any event, DR. LYNCH-WALSH: 10 I think it's been long enough we -- if we're good 11 with this, we're not going to try to write the 12 policy today, but just sort of agree on what we 13 want to put in there and then in preparation for 14 the meeting on January 25th it will get put into 15 a matrix so that we can see what we pulled -what we added into our policy and where -- what 16 17 the source is. 18 A quick interruption. MR. JABOUIN: I'd like 19 to acknowledge Ms. Fertig has joined the meeting. 20 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. 21 MS. FERTIG: Good morning. 22 MS. IGHODARO: I'm here, as well, Itohan. Oh. Oh. We almost have 23 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: 24 everybody, I think. 25 MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Ighodaro as well. Thank

you.

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yes, I heard her. Okay. Good morning.

So just to go through and sort of 4 Okay. 5 check off, I was saying that for the meeting on 6 the 25th I'll put together a matrix of what 7 language we're incorporating and where it's 8 coming from so we can refer back so that we have a comprehensive document, rather than trying to 9 10 write policy. Because I don't know about you 11 guys, but I'm not good at writing policy by 12 committee. But we can certainly agree to what we 13 want to put in here. And in some cases wording 14 might change from inspector general to chief 15 auditor. Policy numbers might change. Things 16 like that.

17 So there is language in the -- and also, too, 18 so, for instance, the proposed policy from 2015 19 just had rules, duties and responsibilities. Ιt 20 did have the independent audit committee is 21 advisory in nature, whereas, if we're looking at, 22 this is Dade, it lists a purpose. So we can 23 incorporate -- there may be language that's 24 already in the bylaws, but we just want to 25 basically pick the best of -- the best of each of

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these to create a comprehensive document.

And in reviewing both Miami-Dade and Palm Beach, again, there's a lot of overlap and there is some overlap with our existing bylaws. The bylaws basically form the foundation for our policy. I think instead of us having a policy we just had bylaws.

8 So if we're good with the language that's in here -- a lot of this membership information is 9 10 already established. We're not going to be 11 changing the composition. What I highlighted 12 here, and I think what I got is, members of the 13 audit and budget advisory committee should 14 reflect the Board's commitment to diversity, have 15 a basic understanding of finance and accounting, be able to understand and interpret financial 16 17 statements and audit reports. Members should 18 have a background in auditing, accounting, 19 finance, business management, consulting, or law. 20 That's in -- that's suggestive in our bylaws, I 21 believe, to the Board members. I think that's 22 been in here forever. Or it might be somewhere 23 else.

24 But anyway -- but the wording is different. 25 Instead of saying shall or must, I think -- and

1	if it's not in our bylaws it's in the chief
2	auditor's policy, but I know we have something
3	similar somewhere.
4	Recommendations, blah-blah so if that's
5	something and I'll back up in a second.
6	MS. FERTIG: I find that what we have had,
7	historically, as membership on the audit
8	committee is very limiting.
9	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I know it is. I know it
10	is. But that's basically what everybody else
11	generally has on an audit committee and I believe
12	that Palm Beach has a similar yes, I'm aware
13	it's more limiting. But I think the same
14	language is existing in ours somewhere, but it's
15	not as an edict. It's, you know, Board members
16	should, as opposed to must. So let's
17	MS. FERTIG: And when we discussed this last
18	time did we discuss having a subcommittee meet
19	and hammer these things out before we met again
20	so we could
21	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: We did, but then we
22	didn't we did, but then we didn't have our
23	November meeting to form a subcommittee, so we're
24	just all here going over this. So we
25	And because we didn't have that meeting in

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1 November, now we're pressed for time. I don't 2 necessarily want to be here for hours. So if 3 anybody had any recommendations -- any things they'd like, because everybody's had these two 4 5 since then, then they could send it in. I didn't 6 get any emails as far as what people would like 7 incorporated.

8 MS. FERTIG: I'm sorry, I think I blanked off 9 for a minute, Nathalie. My connection seems to 10 be poor this morning, but --

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yeah, when we -- when we lost a meeting we now have limited time to have a subcommittee. And we're trying to get this done in terms of before the year ends. So -- are you going in and out?

MS. FERTIG: I am. I'm going to leave andcome back in.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay.

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MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Shaw has a question, Chair. DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yes.

MS. SHAW: Hi. Couple things. Number one, could you remove the comments on your screen so it's a little bit easier to read. And number two, I understand we're trying to get this done and want to do it before the end -- we're talking

Page 13 about fiscal year or calendar year, number one? 1 2 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Not calendar year. No, no, 3 not calendar year, that would be like next week. No, no, before the end of 23-24. 4 5 We can have a subcommittee, but the problem 6 is, this is the first time we're all talking 7 since October. So I highlighted and I haven't 8 heard from anybody and we can't -- we don't have 9 time anymore since we had to add a whole meeting, 10 we have two meetings in January. 11 So I can put together what we talked about 12 last time into a matrix. If everybody wants to 13 have a subcommittee, but the thing is, a 14 subcommittee is still a public meeting. I just 15 don't --MS. SHAW: So my question, Dr. Lynch-Walsh is 16 17 this. If this is something that we need to get 18 done in a, let's say, five-month period, because 19 at least January through May, I'm going to 20 exclude June, wouldn't it then make sense for us 21 to have a draft to work from? Because working 22 from seven different documents --23 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Different documents, that's 24 what I'm trying --25 MS. SHAW: And we're spending -- we're going

to spend two hours kind of going through this, to me is a waste of time.

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: No, I'm not trying to do that. I'm not trying to do that at all. So I haven't heard anything from anybody. I went through here, I'm planning to have a draft for the January 25th meeting. We went through --

MR. JABOUIN: Chair? Please be careful with your communications with the other members on an item that you're going to put on a future agenda.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: We're in a public meetingright now.

MR. JABOUIN: Right now, but the emails thatyou may have outside the meeting.

15 I don't have -- okay. DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Mr. Jabouin, please. I'm well versed in Sunshine 16 17 Gathering information is not a violation of Law. 18 Sunshine Law. Having a discussion with somebody 19 back and forth about what should or shouldn't be 20 in the policy would be a violation. There is a 21 difference. 22 MR. JABOUIN: Correct. Absolutely.

23 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: You have to be able to 24 gather. If someone said, I like this, that, or 25 the other. So I've highlighted things that we

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1	don't have in what in our documents so far.
2	MR. JABOUIN: So you're well aware. I
3	withdraw the question, Chair.
4	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. So I also
5	MS. SHAW: I was going to tell you guys to
6	take that off-line, number one.
7	Number two, I really believe that we need to
8	start with a draft, start with either ours and
9	look at because what I don't want us to do is
10	sit here and go through Palm Beach and all of the
11	other areas and then I don't want to do that.
12	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. But were you with us
13	in October? Because we kind of did go through
14	them and nobody had an issue with them. So what
15	I did with this is I highlighted and crossed out
16	things that were I crossed out things where we
17	have to follow what's already in our in 1070.
18	I highlighted things where well, in this
19	where it's different from ours or it's not and
20	I crossed out things that are not relevant. But
21	I can start with a draft. We have but this
22	is we have a draft from 2015, but it's just
23	the bylaws. So I can, for the 25th, and then by
24	the 25th we would have a better sense of on
25	the 11th we could pick a subcommittee date. I

just don't want things going completely off the rails as far as we're trying to strengthen the role of the audit committee, not weaken it. So I can put that together.

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Today I just wanted to kind of have a refresher and also discuss some additional information we might need for our January 11th meeting. And I'm hoping to be done in an hour.

9 So these are the things that I highlighted. 10 They're -- one of the significant differences 11 between what we have and what the two, our 12 neighbors to the north and south have, have to do 13 with the chief auditor and the chief auditor or 14 inspector general in their case's evaluations and 15 making recommendations and sitting on the 16 selection committee. That, we don't have 17 anything like that. Some of -- pardon?

MS. FERTIG: Can I just go back? I thought when we left in October we were going to get a subcommittee to kind of do what Phyllis just suggested, get a draft going that we could just bring the draft to the meeting and go through that.

24DR. LYNCH-WALSH: And before you hopped off25and came back on, the problem is that we never

had a November meeting and --1 2 MS. FERTIG: I understand. So let me just 3 finish, if I could. So rather than waiting until the 11th to set a date for that, perhaps we could 4 5 set a date for it now so it can be advertised, 6 get that done and then be ready by the 25th to 7 accomplish what you want to get accomplished, 8 what we want to get accomplished. 9 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right. So here's -- and 10 here's the potential problem with that. Let me 11 check when the due date is for advertisements. 12 Hold on. 13 MR. JABOUIN: It's likely that staff is out 14 next week to be able to get that in, as well. 15 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Well, there's still this Hold on. January -- and then when would 16 week. 17 the January date be? Because we're meeting on 18 the 11th. On the 11th of January we still have 19 time to set a date. But not -- that would be for 20 February. So hold on. Let's see. What did 21 Amanda. 22 MS. MARQUARDT: This is Michelle. Yeah, we 23 already got the proof for the January meeting and 24 I think she's getting ready to post it, I think 25 by Friday. I'd have to look in my email.

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1	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: That's what I'm looking for
2	right now because I get the emails from her, so
3	I'm trying to see oh, look at that, Wednesday
4	December 20th for any changes.
5	So we would have to pick a subcommittee
6	meeting date for January now, which I'm fine
7	with, but there are deadlines that we have to
8	adhere to. So if she needs any changes, she
9	needs it today.
10	MR. JABOUIN: Would this be an in-person
11	meeting?
12	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: It doesn't have to be.
13	Because that's another constraint is, we couldn't
14	have an in-person meeting in December because of
15	availability of the room and so on and so forth.
16	So as as of right now, if everybody would
17	check in their calendars, and a subcommittee
18	meeting can be on Teams, what day in January
19	that's not the 11th or the 25th or any day that
20	we already have stuff going on would people want
21	to meet and does it need to be during the day or
22	can it be in the evening?
23	MS. IGHODARO: This is Itohan, I have a
24	question. For me
25	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yes?

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1	MS. IGHODARO: Is everyone going to be a part
2	of is everyone wanting to be a part of this
3	subcommittee?
4	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Everyone can be. We have a
5	small enough group.
6	MS. FERTIG: But we don't have to be is the
7	answer.
8	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Why do you ask? Ms.
9	Ighodaro?
10	MS. IGHODARO: Because I feel if we are going
11	to create a subcommittee to do the same exact
12	thing that we are all going to meet to do it sort
13	of defeats the purpose.
14	MS. CARTER-LYNCH: My question this is
15	Ruth, I'm going to chime in. My understanding is
16	that the subcommittee was already chosen; right,
17	Mr. Jabouin?
18	MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Carter-Lynch, a committee
19	has not yet been chosen yet by this audit
20	committee. If you choose to do so, I did want to
21	mention from a calendar standpoint, there is a
22	holiday in January and if our staff is needed we
23	are preparing for the 25th meeting in the week
24	before that.
25	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right. So this is why I

was proposing to bring less of what people have opined on and more here are the different sources of information we have and here's what's in these different documents as a matrix. And then people can pick either by committee, by subcommittee, what we want to move forward with and then that would be approved by the committee as a whole.

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MR. JABOUIN: Chair, Mr. Mayersohn is waiting to speak.

10 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Oh, yes, Mr. Mayersohn? MR. MAYERSOHN: 11 So I'm going to be bold 12 enough to say, Dr. Lynch-Walsh, you have done a 13 marvelous job as far as coordinating all these 14 efforts and putting it together. I think kind of 15 echoing what Ms. Shaw said and Ms. Fertig said, and I don't want to put too much work on your 16 17 shoulders, but if you can create a document that 18 is a -- you know, takes everything into 19 consideration, which I think would save us a lot 20 of time and energy and stress, maybe, maybe put 21 more stress on you, and that's why I'm -- you 22 know, I'm asking you if you'd be willing to do that, and then -- I mean, I don't know what 23 24 anybody's schedule looks like the first week in January or the fact that it's, you know, after 25

the holidays, but, maybe towards the end of the week have an hour meeting, it could be a Zoom meeting or a Teams meeting, and say here's what it is, this is coming before the committee in two weeks, does anybody have any concerns, questions, and make a presentation at that point?

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: You mean --

MS. FERTIG: I agree.

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9 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I'd like to get clarity 10 from Mr. Mayersohn for one second. When you say 11 that's coming before the committee in two weeks, 12 you mean on the 25th?

13 MR. MAYERSOHN: Correct, the January 25th 14 meeting. So we would have two weeks to send it 15 out for the entire committee if somebody didn't want to participate in the subcommittee, to send 16 17 it out or, again, if they couldn't make it, send 18 it out, and then review either, you know, voting 19 it up, making amendments, voting it down, doing 20 whatever on the 25th.

21 MR. JABOUIN: Chair, if I could add, can you 22 do this on the meeting on the 11th since we 23 already have that time blocked off and you do 24 agenda planning later. Even though that agenda 25 won't add, that could potentially be done on the

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11th.

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MS. FERTIG: We have so much stuff on the 11th.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: We do. 4 5 MS. FERTIG: The agenda is so full. And to 6 echo Ruth, when we met in October, I thought that 7 Ruth and I -- I mean, I thought several of us 8 said we would work on this. I'm more comfortable 9 with a subcommittee approach than a single 10 individual approach, particularly since I know

11 that person's very busy and it's the holiday 12 season.

13 What's our drop-dead deadline on this,14 Nathalie?

15 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: There isn't one. However, seeing if we're going to incorporate policy 16 17 language that includes the chief auditor 18 evaluation and that starts happening in April and 19 May, I'm more comfortable with compiling it based 20 on the -- there was sort of a subcommittee, but I 21 believe either the chair or the committee has to 22 vote on it and we never met to vote on anything 23 and we won't do that until January. So I'm 24 trying to come up with a happy medium where, to 25 Mr. Mayersohn's point, if we have a -- if it gets

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thrown together, put together, compiled, which is the word, because it's -- it's one thing for me to look at several documents, but I don't necessarily -- at once, but putting it into a matrix, Mr. Mayersohn, for what date? Are you saying the 5th or the 12th.

7 MR. MAYERSOHN: No, I was thinking the 4th,
8 5th; either one.

9 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. My child goes back 10 to school on the 4th. I have a child still home. 11 The 5th for a meeting date, because today is the 12 day we would need to pick a date that everybody's 13 available at a mutually convenient time.

MR. JABOUIN: If my team -- I'm not available
on that week, though, as far as my schedule.

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay.

17 MS. SHAW: And, I'm sorry, let me jump in. Ι 18 would not recommend the first week that school is 19 going back or even the first two weeks. There's 20 so much going on. Plus we have a meeting that 21 week. The following week is fine, the 17, 18, 22 19, 20 and the next week. I think that will give 23 us enough time because everyone will be busy 24 during the holiday not even looking at this. So 25 probably right up to the 1st of the year is when

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1	folks are going to be looking at the this and be
2	able to provide feedback. And so we've got to be
3	conscientious about, you know, the dates and
4	people's time.
5	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. So having said all
6	that hold on Mr. Jabouin.
7	MR. JABOUIN: Sure.
8	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Having said all that, I
9	think we're right back to where we started, and
10	then if I were to put a matrix together for us to
11	discuss on the 25th, and then from there we could
12	do a subcommittee meeting. We could also look
13	now, by then, any February dates would have
14	passed. So for us picking February subcommittee
15	dates we would have to do that at your meeting on
16	the 11th. That we can do at a meeting, is pick a
17	date. We don't have time I can't hear Mary if
18	she's talking, but
19	MS. FERTIG: Can we do that today, Nathalie?
20	Can we just pick a date?
21	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: You want everybody to know
22	a date in February? We don't need February
23	today.
24	MS. FERTIG: Well, here's my concern.
25	Overall with the committee, and this is this

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Page 25 is -- and you're doing a great job, so this is 1 2 not -- we are just so far behind on stuff overall 3 that I hate to take any time away on the 11th from what is going to be a packed agenda. 4 5 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: All we would be doing is 6 picking a date because it's before the deadline 7 for February. That's it. That's it. Picking a 8 date. 9 MS. FERTIG: All right. Whatever. 10 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Because we would all be 11 there at the meeting on the 11th and it's within 12 the timeframe to pick a date for a February 13 meeting. 14 MS. FERTIG: I'm understanding that. I'm 15 just saying I don't know why we can't just pick a date in February and just do it. 16 17 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: We can try to pick one now 18 but we don't -- we don't have to pick a date now. 19 It's January. suggesting the week before our meeting, which is when I would have to produce a matrix, anyway, is the week before the meeting. So let's then go with that.

5 If everybody on right now knows when they're 6 available or not available in February they can 7 pick a subcommittee date. But I think we also 8 need for a subcommittee, yes, you sometimes have 9 volunteers, but I don't know off the top of my 10 head what the rules are for members of a 11 subcommittee, if they have to be voted on. There was 13 just an item, I want to say it was F3, so that's 14 in the -- contained in the ACFR, that discussion, and we just want to see where we're at because I 15 keep hearing whispers and -- about the general 16 17 fund balance becoming a problem in a couple of 18 months, where we get down to the bare minimum 19 that we're supposed to have. So I just want to 20 make sure we're aware of that. So the Proposed 21 HR Audit Plan --

MS. FERTIG: Sorry, Nathalie. Are you saying we're getting down to the bare minimum of what we're budgeted for the year or we're getting -or the general fund is getting --

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1	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: The latter. The latter.
2	The general fund balance is because people
3	have been spending more than they ought to, and
4	there's an explanation that all of those one-time
5	payments that were made to the different
6	bargaining units, that's what's caused one of the
7	issues. So the balance, I'll up that when we
8	get I have that as Item C on here, the first
9	one I have the Proposed HR Audit Plan. So
10	MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Shaw wishes to speak.
11	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yes, Ms. Shaw?
12	MS. SHAW: Hi. So
13	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: We'll get back to it.
14	MS. SHAW: Why is it that the district
15	doesn't have a setup or scheduled fund balance as
16	dictated by GFOA or any other promulgation that
17	says we need to set aside a certain percentage of
18	fund balance, number one? Number two, if that
19	fund balance is set aside because just like
20	all of us need to have a savings account or
21	something set aside, the district more so needs
22	to have that. And, number two, when it is set up
23	and set aside it should be that only school board
24	members should be able to use it and for varied
25	reasons. It has to be absolutely for necessary

reasons. Why is it -- why is it and why are we discussing that, number three?

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I'll get -- when I get to C I'll pull up the ACFR and then I'll pull up the item that was on the agenda, I think, last week or the week before, I'm losing track of which week we're on.

8 So, they do, but they have -- when you hit a 9 certain threshold you have to report to the 10 state, provide a plan for how you're going to 11 recover, and we're inching closer and closer to 12 that number. This is why, for instance, the 13 Behavioral Threat Assessment they didn't want to 14 fund the 200-plus thousand that we needed to pay 15 RSM to do it, out, you know, externally, citing that they had no money. But then they hired 16 17 people that it's questionable whether they could 18 have gotten along without, to the tune of the 19 same amount of money. So the Board keeps saying 20 they don't have money on the operations side but 21 keeps hiring people on the operations side while 22 not paying for an audit that we thought was 23 important. But we'll pull that up. 24 So, anyway, Proposed HR -- and, remember,

Page 36 motion, we had a discussion about auditing 1 2 internal controls over HR and the other piece was 3 procurement. So this is the piece that refers to So this is what we were given prior to what 4 HR. 5 would have been our November meeting and it lists 6 what's in scope, not in scope, and then has some 7 notes. 8 MS. FERTIG: Why is Talent Acquisition 9 Operations Instructional not in scope but 10 Non-Instructional is in scope? 11 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Mr. Jabouin? 12 MS. FERTIG: I would like to ask that. 13 MR. JABOUIN: Yeah, so, thank you, Ms. 14 Fertig. So the Instructional Group has labor 15 union factors that have to be considered. That's the primary reason as far as the Instructional 16 17 Group. The Non-Instructional Group does not. 18 Well, it does, but not as significant as the 19 Instructional Group. 20 So, but -- but, actually, DR. LYNCH-WALSH: 21 to further clarify, the instructional side are 22 the EPs and I want to say ES -- I think ESPs. 23 But on the Non-Instructional there are TSPs, 24 FOPE, COPA. So, really, what you're -- when you 25 say Non-Instructional not in scope, it's, really,

Page 37 screws leaving out teachers, basically. 1 2 Leaving out teachers for the MR. JABOUIN: 3 most part; yes. But the COPA, the ESMAB, and the FOPE, those individuals would be included. 4 5 Okay. And this is what --6 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: 7 MS. FERTIG: Could we phrase that differently 8 on the matrix, could you put who's being --9 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: The bargaining units? 10 MR. JABOUIN: Yeah, I think there's a better 11 way to state what's being -- you know, who's --12 what the audit's going to cover and what it's 13 not. 14 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. So your first thing 15 is to break down, when you say Non-Instructional versus what's in -- and then Instructional and 16 17 what's not in scope, break it down. So between 18 the bargaining units. 19 MS. FERTIG: Yes. Thank you. 20 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. Because there are 21 bigger more -- it's a fundamental problem with 22 what's being proposed here, a couple of them. Timeframe will be from July 1, 2023 forward. 23 New 24 organizational chart changes subsequent to July 25 1, 2023 will be considered. Audit projects will

be compliance based. They will opine on
 judgments but only whether they were completed
 for hiring decisions and evaluations.
 Well, you can be completed, but not be in

10 MR. JABOUIN: The job descriptions will be 11 looked at, but there are certain areas of the job 12 descriptions, as far as wording, that we're not 13 able to opine on.

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay.

MR. JABOUIN: We'll make sure that the process is followed as far as who is involved and how the job descriptions are approved, but as far as the content, as far as what a position does on a day-to-day basis we would not be able to do so.

20 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. Yeah, I think you're 21 going to have to explain -- so, but we'll go look 22 at some other things that suggest what an HR 23 audit should look like.

24Okay. Other exclusions may occur based on25fieldwork as well as legal requirements. Audit

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work papers will not include copies of restricted documents. Start of audit would be the fourth fiscal quarter.

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All right. In my experience around here when 4 5 people know that you're looking, so, for 6 instance, when I worked at this gold 7 manufacturer, we did not send them engraved 8 invitations that we were about to audit inventory 9 because we didn't want people throwing stuff into 10 their shoes and wherever else they would hide 11 gold pieces. We would just pick up and march 12 from accounting over to the factory side. 13 Because you don't want them to know that you're coming. That's the nature -- in an audit you 14 15 don't, like, announce it. So if everybody knows that it's just from July 1 and we discuss this --16 17 we've been discussing this for months now, I have 18 no doubt that -- I do -- I am aware of some funky 19 things that have occurred recently, but for the 20 most part I have no doubt that since July 1 21 people have been cleaning up their act on certain 22 matters.

23 So this is all we got essentially for the 24 scope of work. What I wanted to show everybody 25 is --

Page 40 MR. JABOUIN: Mr. De Meo has a question. 1 2 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yes, Mr. De Meo. 3 MR. DE MEO: Yes. I might be recalling incorrectly, but I thought one of the primary 4 5 purposes of this audit was to review and look at the internal controls in HR and I don't see 6 7 anything about that. 8 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: You are not incorrect. You 9 are correct. That is what this was supposed to 10 be about, were the internal controls. 11 I will be -- so, Mr. Jabouin? 12 MR. JABOUIN: So I wanted to mention as far 13 as, I can probably expand a little bit there. So 14 you take a look at, for example, the employee 15 evaluations. So the different aspects as far as 16 the BASA and the other evaluation methods for the 17 different types of employees, you know, is it done on time; is it done within statute; was it 18 19 done within policy? We wouldn't be able to make 20 any judgments on there with respect to how an 21 employee was evaluated. As it pertains to the 22 non-instructional pieces and along the lines of 23 what you're talking, Mr. De Meo, a position would 24 need to be approved and there would have to be 25 controls for that. And then there are controls

with respect to the position being advertised, the recruiting, the screening, the selection committee, the interviews, the hire, the onboarding, and then -- and then task assignments, acting appointments, people working out of class. So all of those type of things are part of what would be looked at and there are controls that would be looked at as far as that.

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9 There's also, as it pertains to the 10 compensation area, as far as, you know, the 11 evaluations that they do, the determinations that 12 they do, as well.

So, you know, job descriptions, supplement
stipends, the salary grades, all of those type of
things would also be looked at, Mr. De Meo.

I would suggest, and not to give 16 MR. DE MEO: 17 you more work, I know you're busy, but it would 18 have been nice just to identify the major 19 controls and maybe sub-controls under those, 20 maybe the top 10 or the major controls, and give 21 us some idea on how you would approach testing 22 them. That's what I was kind of looking for. But if we're going off in a different direction, 23 24 then -- you know.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: No, that's what I was

looking for. Anyone else? Because I think --

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MS. FERTIG: Yes. Yes. And I -- and I -and I think because we were asking, I'm going back to a budget conversation of limited dollars and I think we were trying to squeeze some of these things in. So I would hope we'd stay focused on what we had articulated as the need --

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Which was internal controls over HR.

10 MR. JABOUIN: I wanted to mention from a 11 timing standpoint, so far I've -- I've met with 12 the chief people officer. I have not had the 13 opportunity to meet with the -- with the 14 directors underneath that person so I could 15 inventory the different controls that they have. 16 So these meetings would need to happen in order 17 for me to be able to understand the inventory of 18 the controls that are there in the first place 19 that would be tested. So I have not had the 20 opportunity to do so. So I did spend time with 21 the chief people officer to be able to go over 22 some of the controls from his standpoint, but --23 but as far as understanding all of the controls, 24 those particular meetings and those analysis, I 25 have not been able to do that just yet.

Page 43 1 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. So hold on, Mr. 2 Jabouin. From Mr. De Meo's standpoint, you 3 should be able to give us generically, here's a list of the types of controls. The reason I've 4 5 pulled up what looks like a statute and is, is that the school board is responsible from a 6 7 statutory standpoint in 1001.42, number 5, they 8 are responsible for certain things regarding personnel. And these could be the different 9 10 areas where we're looking at whether controls are 11 in place. These would be, designate positions to 12 be filled, job descriptions, so, org chart, 13 prescribe qualifications for those positions, job descriptions, provide for the appointment, 14 15 compensation, promotion, suspension, and 16 dismissal of employees subject to the 17 requirements of Chapter 1012. 18 So those are the areas that the Board is on 19 the hook for adhering to from a statutory 20 standpoint. And in terms of Mr. De Meo's 21 expectations, what I was expecting to see was 22 something more generic, to begin with, that 23 gets -- that explains what it is this would be 24 from an internal controls standpoint. So when I 25 start Googling things like an HR audit, what are

the goals of an HR audit when it comes to internal controls? What are the different types? We're looking for an internal controls audit. That could have been addressed generally so that everybody had an understanding and then specifically in terms of the district and the types of controls.

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8 So for our meeting on the 11th, regardless of 9 your conversations, we're not looking for you to 10 give us a list of what they have so much as a 11 blueprint for what they ought to have, what is 12 standard practice in terms of HR controls? So 13 that you can do independent of speaking to them.

So for the 11th I would -- instead of what we got here, which doesn't speak to internal controls so much as it speaks to what you will and won't do is, what is this audit? And then, me, personally, my biggest problem here is that if we go back to how this all started, this started with an issue in your department.

So the idea that your department, you and your department would be the ones performing this audit, speaking as one audit committee member, I'm not comfortable with that. Because the lack of compliance with doing the evaluations was a --

So I So I will make that decision MR. JABOUIN: and make the recommendation to the Board. But I will take on advisory comments for inclusion into the audit. Because, ultimately, those decisions

18 are with the chief auditor on that. An audit of internal controls related to HR, what this audit should look like? Not the specific departments, but what internal controls have you laid out?

JABOUIN: So what I will do in response 11 to that, so, obviously, due to timing, the week 12 before the meeting when the district returns on 13 the 8th, I will be able to email the committee a 14 list of HR controls that would be looked at and 15 then I will be prepared to take advisory comments 16 to add to that at the January 11th meeting.

13	advance. Because, remember, these are items that	
14	were supposed to be on our November agenda. So	
15	if they're saying they will perform a comparative	
16	analysis of the school deficiency listings	
17	developed as part of 2014 and the various scopes	
18	of work, so I think, Mr. De Meo, it's, as I'm	
19	reading this, so the deficiency listings I	
20	think I might be able to answer this, though.	
21	Because what got done and what was listed as	
22	deficiencies are often two different things	
23	because as as it turns out, a lot of the	
24	deficiency lists, they were not comprehensive,	
25	they were just what people could see on that	

particular day. So within HVAC, for instance, the deficiency listing would identify that the HVAC was at the end of its useful life or such and such part was broken, but if there were three to five other parts that would make it work or electrical, they weren't necessarily captured. So then when they go to do the work they find that there were additional things that needed to be done.

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10 Yes, we're probable going to have a whole 11 conversation about the building department thrown 12 in there, but as someone that's painfully 13 familiar with the deficiency listings and scopes 14 of work, one of the issues is that they were not 15 comprehensive. And in some cases you may have the reverse. We know roofing -- roofing at 16 17 Stranahan, a different problem with roofing is 18 that the walkways which are only now being 19 discussed for replacement they're attached --20 some of them are attached to the building and 21 were included in the square footage for the 22 roofing scope, but they didn't get replaced, 23 because when they went to do the roof they go, 24 oh, there's all this -- these lines running up 25 here, we're not touching that. So you can look

at Stranahan roofs and see that they only replaced what was over the building, not the walkways. So I think they mean things like that.

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MR. DE MEO: Yeah, I think that's important, but it might be helpful to say comparative analysis of the school deficiency listings and the timelines and the work as completed. In other words, I think we were concerned about these deficiencies were identified but they were, let's say, ignored for the needs of other schools.

12 So this analysis should show a timeline of 13 which were the most important deficiencies and 14 then when were they completed versus all the 15 other schools. And I thought we had talked about 16 that. But I'm not sure what they mean by a 17 comparative analysis. Yeah.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I think they mean comparing like if there were multiple -- if there was a deficiency that listed five things did they do all five when they executed the work?

22 MR. JABOUIN: I think eventually, though, 23 Chair, the deficiency listings eventually made 24 it's way into the 2014 needs assessment. 25 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: That is the needs

assessment. The school deficiency listings is the 2014 needs assessment. If you look at the needs assessment, that is comprised of a list of deficiencies. They mean the same thing.

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So that's why it says an analysis of the school deficiency listings developed as part of the 2014 facilities needs assessment. Those two phrases refer to the same data.

9 Then you have, once they put a project 10 together, you may have a different scope of work. 11 And then the deficiency listings, to Mr. De Meo's 12 point, there are things listed as deficiencies 13 that were not indicated to be funded by the bond, 14 like a lot of deferred maintenance.

15 So I think it's fair for them to clarify, because I'm just going off of what I know. 16 What 17 I know and what they meant here may be two 18 different things. So if they could have -- if 19 they can elaborate and clarify as to what they 20 meant, because the objectives and scope, that's 21 kind of all they're listing and then they have 22 their approach. So --

23 MS. FERTIG: Can I just add Nathalie -- can I 24 just add, and I know you noted this, but if you 25 were to go back, and you can because it's all on

1	tape, you would note that there were a lot of	
2	concerns about the manner in which the	
3	deficiencies were documented.	
4	MR. JABOUIN: Could you repeat that, please?	
5	MS. FERTIG: Can you hear me? I don't know.	
6	You froze.	
7	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: You broke up. So repeat	
8	what you just said.	
9	MS. FERTIG: Yeah. There were I'm so	
10	sorry, I don't know what's going on. But as	
11	Nathalie knows, because we spent our whole life	
12	there in the summer of 2014 can you hear me	
13	now?	
14	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yes.	
15	MR. JABOUIN: Yes.	
16	MS. FERTIG: There were many concerns about	
17	the identification, about the way they identified	
18	deficiencies and about the methods they used.	
19	So but certainly there's a compliance at the	
20	time which would be easy to share and maybe at	
21	the next meeting.	
22	MR. JABOUIN: I think I picked up the first	
23	part.	
24	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Hang on, I thought sharing.	
25	MS. FERTIG: You have it on the screen? I'm	

sorry.

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: No, no, I don't. That was the problem. I thought I did.

MS. FERTIG: Okay. Thank you. Because I thought I was really missing out here. Okay.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. Well, we all were. Okay. So, for instance, site level deficiencies, this is Stranahan.

9 MR. JABOUIN: Could you please explain this
10 document, Chair? Is this the needs --

11 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: This is -- this is the 12 needs assessment. This is the MAPPS. It should 13 say it on the bottom. This is straight out of MAPS from 2014. It was captured I want to say on 14 15 September 14th, 2014 or somewhere -- well, this one says the 2nd. I guess they were done by the 16 17 14th. So this is the deficiency listing that 18 that document, when they refer to a deficiency 19 listing here, the school deficiency listings 20 developed as part of the 2014 Facilities Needs 21 Assessment, there is no -- these deficiency 22 listings rolled their way, wherever it says GOB, 23 if you were to add up roofing -- and, actually, 24 that exercise was never done. They never ticked 25 and tied these different line items to see if

1	they added up, but this is the deficiency listing	
2	for Stranahan. So roofing, this is the sight	
3	level, those are the walkways and those are	
4	supposed to be covered you know, actually begs	
5	the question, did this get done? And this may be	
6	the walkways I'm referring to. We have	
7	electrical.	
8	MS. FERTIG: The walkways were in and	
9	removed. They were supposed to be done and they	
10	were not.	
11	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right. But, like I said	
12	MS. FERTIG: But that's what the audit's	
13	going to show.	
14	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right. Well, so as long as	
15	they're looking for the right thing.	
16	So when so you have the roofs that were	
17	replaced at Stranahan are included. Some of them	
18	are included in the roofing. So let's say we	
19	were looking at, I don't know if it I don't	
20	think Building 1 is one of them, but Building 1	
21	roofing, 20 pardon?	
22	MS. FERTIG: Yeah, Building 1 is the	
23	roof one. Well, in any event, to Mr. De Meo's	
24	point, these lists were there and they were very	
25	controversial and and there were some things	

that, for example, Nathalie brought up the walkways that were in the bond that didn't get done, I'm assuming all of that's going to be captured.

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Well, they were listed as deficiencies, but there was something about walkways being attached to roofs, where does the roof end, and so they left the walkways alone because it would have cost too much money to tear them down and replace them because of the utilities; yes.

MR. JABOUIN: Ms. Fertig, if I understand you right, your point is, the method that was used to gather the deficiency listing, is that your point, Ms. Fertig?

16MS. FERTIG: Well, I have a couple points.17One, that was controversial in and of itself.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: But the Board approved, the
 Board decided to --

MS. FERTIG: But the second point is, what was to be included in the actual project, not the deficiencies, but what was to be included in the projects that may have got removed from the project along the way because of cost or some other consideration. And I'm assuming all of

this will come out in the audit. That's why you're doing it; right?

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MR. DE MEO: Well, the audit, right now the scope is limited to this document is what it says. But something important, thank you for showing this, it shows the priority, and I think that should be the focus.

8 MS. FERTIG: Well, yeah, let me go back. I 9 was just going to say that. Yeah.

10 MR. DE MEO: It shows the -- it should --11 that's the focus. The audit, in my opinion, 12 should show in what timeframe were these 13 deficiencies remediated compared to the 14 priorities of other schools. And if they find 15 that other schools had lower priority items completed prior to higher priority items, that's 16 17 what we're looking for. And I think this, as 18 incomplete or as inadequate as it might be, at 19 least it gives them something objectively to 20 start with in terms of priority. And then that 21 would be a useful analysis. But I'm not as close 22 to it as, you know, Chair or Mary are, but that's 23 my -- that's my view on it. 24

24 MS. FERTIG: You know, I'm glad you're -- I'm 25 glad you're bringing this up and I will -- I'm

Page 59 going to go back and there were other documents 1 2 at the time. Nathalie pulled some of those as to 3 what -- there's this scope here and then there's how they prioritized the project on what was 4 5 supposed to be done first, second, third, fourth, 6 fifth, and -- and -- and needless to say, 7 sometimes simpler projects got done first and 8 others were still waiting. 9 So, yeah. So inasmuch as this is included, 10 that's one thing, but there may be other 11 documents that should be. 12 MR. JABOUIN: Ultimately, if RSM finds that 13 the data was presented to the Board and the Board chose to go a certain direction and 14 15 re-prioritize, then that would be the Board's decision assuming that they had all the 16 17 information. 18 They didn't do that. DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Thev 19 were just because of costs. 20 So in the approach here it mentions, and the 21 work performed by the construction manager. Now, 22 I know that everybody knows there's a program 23 manager. The construction manager is the company 24 actually doing the construction. So the 25 construction manager for the most part, they're

1 not the ones that were dictating the scope. You 2 had the architects, you had Heery. On The Big 3 3 the scope started with Heery and the district for these -- because these have been around forever. 4 5 You have procurement methods. For all three of these -- I believe all three of these started out 6 7 as design/build and then turned into CMARs and 8 then I think may have been put out more than 9 Northeast, I see renovations, new once. 10 addition, renovations to Building 12. Northeast, 11 which was just supposed to be reroofed and then 12 eventually got a new building along the way, 13 similar to Stranahan, which they were supposed to renovate the cafeteria. And these all explain 14 15 why things took forever and a day. And then with Blanch Ely, their bus loop, which they're still 16 17 waiting on, wasn't part of it even though 18 demolishing the building was and their bus loop 19 was attached to buildings.

But they mentioned the construction manager, which is different from the various scopes of work executed, because you would have a scope of work that was created by the architect and everybody would have approved that, then you have, if it was CMAR, the CMAR has a scope of

work, and this was all getting managed first by Heery and then by AECOM. So I guess we need to clarify why they went with the word "construction manager" as opposed -- yes, the work is being performed in these cases, I think they're all CMAR, so that would be correct. But it seems to be limited to looking at the CMAR versus the entire district and who was managing it as a whole.

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Comparative analysis, executed scope of work and the work performed. They do list it as three different things. We anticipate performing the following procedures.

14 What select board advisory committees?
15 Conduct interviews with key stakeholders as
16 available to obtain an understanding of each
17 project's history. Key stakeholders may include
18 but are not limited to.

19 MR. JABOUIN: Yeah, so if the committee may 20 remember, we were also asked to check with the 21 diversity committee and attend the Facilities 22 Task Force committee meetings as well, and then 23 they also wanted to also find out what relevant 24 committees were in place at the time of the bond. 25 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Uh-huh. Okay. Yes, you

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1	went there. But this is them performing the	
2	following procedures. Because you know who never	
3	gets asked anything about projects, usually, me	
4	and FTF, even though and I'm not saying asking	
5	for opinion, we have a wealth of documentation or	
б	can point people in the direction of	
7	documentation. But somehow they never make it	
8	our way.	
9	MR. JABOUIN: No, but they did go to	
10	Facilities Task Force and I went with them on	
11	that end.	
12	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: For the development of the	
13	scope.	
14	MR. JABOUIN: Yes.	
15	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: For the development of the	
16	scope.	
17	MR. JABOUIN: Correct.	
18	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: So not as they try to	
19	understand even the discussion we're having here.	
20	So in what they're looking at, Castaldi,	
21	obtain an understanding of how project scope	
22	development was considered as part of the	
23	district's long-term planning. Well, that didn't	
24	happen. Review the deficiency listings. As long	
25	as review key contractual documents, i.e.,	

professional services, construction; okay, so those should all get us there.

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MS. FERTIG: So, Nathalie, if we have documents, I'm assuming we should just try to send those to Joris, I'm thinking through this conversation, the Castaldi, even though they're historic on Stranahan and Northeast, to compare with the scope of work that was eventually determined. And -- the FCI from Jacobs and that kind of stuff, is that --

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right, which we have, which everybody has. But the Castaldi reports, they were uploading whatever they could find to the FTF Teams channel. 14

15 So that's why I'm saying, the idea that nobody would say, hey, we want to know the 16 17 fastest way to find X, Y and Z, where should we 18 I presume staff would tell them, but I hope ao? 19 we don't hear -- and we can have this discussion 20 on the 11th, but, yes, they -- you may have more 21 historical documents, but there's other 22 documents -- and the Castaldis, though, since 23 that became a conversation, we have -- we should 24 have for The Big 3.

MS. FERTIG: Okay. I have them, if not.

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1	MR. JABOUIN: Thank you, Ms. Fertig.
2	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I believe they were
3	uploaded. So I think they've listed all the
4	relevant documents.
5	MR. JABOUIN: I believe that we have them, as
6	well, but I will take an extra copy, Ms. Fertig,
7	if you have one.
8	MS. FERTIG: Okay.
9	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: They're in our Teams
10	MS. FERTIG: Yeah.
11	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. So, let's see. So
12	the last two bullets on here for each project,
13	validate S/M/WBE goals are consistent with other
14	SMART projects, perform testing. So since
15	they're using words like validate or perform
16	testing, I'm assuming they're not going to be
17	asking people their opinion.
18	I did an analysis earlier this year to look
19	at commitments versus payments to, we were
20	looking specifically at African American firms
21	and they were at 12. When you removed
22	self-performing primes they were at 12.5 percent
23	of commitments, which doesn't suggest a huge
24	success rate. But they would be looking just at
25	these three schools.

Page 65 Obtain and understanding of district 1 2 processes and procedures for monitoring 3 compliance with SREF and district design standards. Inquire of management whether 4 5 potential or known instances of noncompliance exist. Are we saying we would ask the fox 6 7 whether they ate the chickens? Because that kind 8 of sounds like, that's my takeaway from the last 9 part of this sentence. If they are going to 10 obtain an understanding to see if there's any 11 monitoring of compliance with SREF and district 12 design standards like education specifications, I 13 can tell you I sat in a QSEC meeting where almost 14 every architect said that they were not provided 15 with the EdSpecs. So there were a lot of projects where EdSpecs did not come into play and 16 17 that's part of the district's standard for space, 18 equipment, FF&E and all of that. So why would they not --19 20 MR. JABOUIN: Of course they wouldn't just 21 rely on inquiry, but there are times during 22 inquiries where individuals reveal issues of lack 23 of controls and nonadherence that comes out of

24 that process. And RSM's been --

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I guess it depends on who

they ask.

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MR. JABOUIN: Yes, of course, it does depend and it has to be evaluated.

Could we also ask that they go 4 MS. FERTIG: 5 back to their roofing audit and compare when the roof at Northeast, which is the roof that was 6 7 used to convince people that we needed to reroof 8 our schools, was completed in context of other roofs in the district? I would say the same 9 10 thing on Stranahan and Blanche Ely, but Northeast 11 is probably the most egregious.

MR. JABOUIN: So, Mrs. Fertig, one of the items that are on the plan is to go back and -and, you know, the roofing work that they had done, I believe and I'm going to take your comments into the scope of that particular work. So that is on RSM's plate, as well.

MS. FERTIG: Yeah, I just, to go to Mr. De Meo's, I just want that compared, that roof that was featured on the evening news night after night, compare when that was fixed compared to the other schools' roofs.

MR. JABOUIN: So noted, Ms. Fertig.
 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. So, so far, as far
 as bigger things that aren't mentioned in this

scope is looking at higher versus lower priority and the timeline to see if lower priority projects, such as roofing, were completed ahead of higher priority.

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5 The way that they prioritized roofs, if memory serves, is that PPO sat around with stacks 6 7 of work orders and looked at who had the most 8 work orders. Because I questioned how Cypress Bay had all of its -- had its projects done ahead 9 10 of, say, Plantation High School when they didn't 11 even have as high a priority level. And Piper 12 had really bad roofs, also, and I believe the 13 first roofs in the district completed were in 14 District 6. They were part of a three-pack. Ι 15 want to say it was -- well, I know they were in District 6. I want to say it was Indian Ridge, 16 17 it was -- was it Manatee, not Manatee Bay. But 18 it was three and they were easier so they got 19 done one, two, three. But they were part of a 20 package deal.

I agree that they should -- that this discussion should include the roofing audit because we haven't had an update on that since it was done and I forget what year.

MR. JABOUIN: That's a -- that's a separate

1	project, let's remember, The Big 3 and the	
2	roofing. So it is on their agenda to do an	
3	update to the roofing work that they had	
4	previously done.	
5	DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I understand, but I think	
6	to Mary's point is where that audit contains	
7	information relevant to auditing The Big 3, we	
8	probably should not ignore that.	
9	MR. JABOUIN: And Mr. De Meo has a question.	
10	MS. FERTIG: And we saw that audit. Oh, I'm	
11	sorry. Go ahead.	
12	MR. DE MEO: No, that's okay, Mary. Finish.	
13	MS. FERTIG: I was just going to say, it's	
14	when we saw that audit from the roofing that we	
15	noticed how many things got done before	
16	Northeast, before you know, and kind of so	
17	I really would just like to see how that came out	
18	in the end. Thanks. Sorry.	
19	MR. DE MEO: Yeah, so I think based on what	
20	the Chair Mary, that you've raised, I think	
21	it's important, critical, that the RSM gives	
22	us their opinion and investigate on how	
23	priorities were set set and how it was	
24	determined that the work should go forward. I	
25	think we need some information on that. That's	

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really important.

MR. JABOUIN: Thank you, Mr. De Meo. And I noted that that's similar to what Chair Lynch-Walsh indicated, so I have noted that.

MR. DE MEO: Thank you.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: And that RSM come prepared to answer that to the meeting rather than be hearing the comments for the first time.

9 MR. JABOUIN: Yes, we will, indeed. So I 10 have noted them and my team is on. They will 11 communicate it to them and they will also ask 12 them to watch this portion of the meeting.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. I'm -- okay. Do we have any more questions or comments on this because then otherwise we can move to the General Fund Balance? I'm trying to pull up the ACFR right now.

Okay. So --

MS. IGHODARO: This is Itohan, I do have a comment. I do want to say that we initially discussed this conversation early last year and somehow this topic got, I don't know, missed from the agenda to get an update on. I'm really, really curious to see what the answer to some of these questions are, especially when it relates

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to the process on how -- who goes first got determined. Because this is a huge issue. And I know that we're talking about it quite lightly, but I'm looking forward to this, long story short.

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Okay. So, yeah, this is 6 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: 7 part of that audit, the answer to the question. 8 We just didn't realize that this audit was 9 happening in the background because we never 10 actually voted to have it moved forward. So it's 11 moving forward and for how things happened you 12 can read the last grand jury report, because a 13 lot of the grand jury report reads like 10 years 14 worth of Facilities Task Force meetings. It had 15 to do with who was the Board member, whether they 16 supported the prior, prior, prior, prior, prior superintendent. A lot of it was political is the 17 18 short answer. So, all right, let me pull up the 19 ACFR. 20 MS. FERTIG: And a lot of it's what's 21 happened for decades. 22 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right, but then the --23 MS. FERTIG: No, I'm just saying. 24 Those who fail to learn DR. LYNCH-WALSH:

from history -- right. They had all the history

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in the world to learn from and still -- still it
 happened.

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MS. FERTIG: Yeah. Okay. I can't wait to hear you on this next one because I've been reading things, but I'm not quite sure what it is, so tell us.

7 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Well -- okay. So this, on 8 page 51 talks about the fund balance. I think 9 I'm looking at the revised ACFR. Because we were 10 looking at this, we were having a discussion 11 about capital assets on FTF.

So the fund balance, and I don't know that they tell you what the balance is, but, basically, the fund balance we have restricted, committed, assigned fund balance, and unassigned fund balance. So in -- let's see. Ah, here we go.

18 The district has adopted Board Policy 3111 19 which provides for a minimum unreserved and 20 undesignated general fund balance of 3 percent of 21 the total annual operating expenditures. In the 22 event the fund balance falls below 3.5 percent 23 the chief financial officer, a position we don't 24 officially currently have, must notify the 25 Superintendent and the Board and future requests

to draw from the fund balance must be approved by the Board by super majority. In the event the fund balance falls below 3 percent the chief financial officer is required to provide a financial plan to the Board to restore the funds to the minimum 3 percent amount along with a timeline for restoration.

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Mr. Jabouin, do you remember off the top of your head or else I'm going to have to pull, I think it was F3, what the balance was for the last amendment?

MR. JABOUIN: Yeah, I would have to pull that up from the meetings documents as well. From the recent December meeting? I'd have to go look for it, Chair.

Okay. So, basically, the 16 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: 17 first problem is when you hit -- when you fall 18 below 3.5. So any future requests to draw from 19 the fund balance must be approved by the Board by 20 super majority. I think we're getting pretty 21 close here to 3.5. And then if it falls below 3, 22 then I believe they also have to report it to the 23 state.

24 But let me go look, then, at the last 25 meeting. I think it was F3, because they're not

25	In other words, if you take the fund balance				

at December 31st, what are you going to compare that to; what expenditures?

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DR. LYNCH-WALSH: They project -- so staff projects where they're going to be, and I think they've been pretty accurate as far as projections when they get the actual. So this is as of June. And somewhere in here it tells you what the actual level is. And I'm trying to remember offhand if we were at 3 -- I think they were at 4.15 and I'm trying to remember if they dipped below 4.

12 MR. DE MEO: And the next question is, how 13 are we involved with this? Do we look at the 14 plan or what is our involvement?

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Well, we're supposed to look at financial statements --

Hold on. Let me go back to our bylaws sincewe don't have a governing policy.

So if we have any -- well, we're supposed to interpret, evaluate, -- now, we're proposing to change our policy, but, basically, looking at review policies and procedures affecting financial areas, make recommendations. Is there a policy related to the decisions they've been making that they're not following? We are

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empowered to investigate any financial matters which are of concern to the committee.

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I would think getting down to your minimum -you know, getting down to your minimum fund balance. So are there activities that they're engaged in that are more global and do they have a plan?

8 Because what I fear is going to happen is, 9 we're hiring these people and then we're going to 10 hear when the org chart comes out, which I want 11 to say is happening in April, that there are 12 going to be massive cuts to staff.

MR. JABOUIN: Chair, with respect to the information, can you go to F4 of the agenda and on the interim financial statements that'll have some information on that.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Oh, you found it? Okay.Hold on. I got my Fs confused.

MR. JABOUIN: And when you get there can yougo to page 5 on the interims?

21 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. Hold on. I always 22 hope the executive summary has more than it does. 23 Hang on. Page 5? 24 MR. JABOUIN: Yes, please.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Okay. There we go.

1 a -- to me, that's kind of an operational 2 management thing. DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Right. I'm not necessarily 3 disagreeing with you. I'm just saying these are 4 5 some of the things that are likely to happen. 6 But, also, when we get the ACFR, a lot of 7 times the discussion, you know, is not that involved. But this is something that's been a 8 9 hot topic for the past few months. 10 So if we're at 4.15 and then at 3.5 percent 11 they have certain responsibilities, we just -- I 12 just wanted everybody to be aware that we're 13 getting close to that. And, certainly, by 14 January 11th maybe we could have an idea of 15 where -- you know, what's the next number we're going to hit. If we were at 4.15 as of September 16 17 30th, where are we starting the next calendar 18 year? 19 MR. JABOUIN: So from what I understand, at 20 the January Board meeting, the October interims 21 will be presented. So they -- let me look at the 22 date for the January Board meeting. So Finance 23 will have that presentation. I know that the

board members continually ask Ms. Motiwala and

So there must be a projection in 11 here somewhere. 12 In other words, 4.15 of 526 million, revenues 13 and other financing, is about 21 million. So 14 what are they basing -- apparently that projected 15 revenue is not here. MR. JABOUIN: So that is something that you 16 17 could ask, but I don't have that information, 18 sir. 19 DR. LYNCH-WALSH: I think I had a similar 20 issue the first time I looked at this and then 21 they gave me a spreadsheet explaining how they 22 arrived at the percentage. And I can't think 23 offhand what's missing from the picture here. 24 So, basically, a breakdown of how we get to the 25 fund balance percentage. It's a projected

general fund excluding charter school revenues and I think that that -- it may not be clear what's excluded.

MR. JABOUIN: So there are some budgetary factors into that calculation.

MR. DE MEO: Yeah, I mean, the 6 7 assigned/unassigned is 94 million. 94 million, 8 that would mean -- if that's 4 percent, that 9 would mean we're talking about 2.5 billion, which 10 is closer to our annual budget. So I don't think 11 we have all of the facts here, but I'm sure 12 somebody has looked at this. And Mr. Chief 13 Auditor, I'm sure you will run those numbers to 14 make sure they're right.

MR. JABOUIN: Sure. Absolutely. And I do know that they do use some projected revenues into that calculation, as well, sir.

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MR. DE MEO: Thank you.

DR. LYNCH-WALSH: Yeah, I recalculated it and it does get you there. But I think an explanation, a better explanation, you know, a note. So for our meeting when we look at the ACFR, that way we can recalculate it ourselves if we were so inclined, to be able to look at it and do the math.

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1	MR. JABOUIN: So the ACFR although, I will							
2	be in touch with them before then, the ACFR will							
3	be the ACFR that was approved by the Board							
4	will be on the January 11th agenda. Ms.
